

Message from the Chair

It has been an exciting year for Varuna. A year of change and growth, while still recognising the importance of tradition and heritage. A year of welcoming over 180 of Australia's best writers to be in residence at Varuna and participate in our events. And a year of community, building connections with local writers, volunteers, staff and Blue Mountains businesses. During this time, I have met personally with many of the people who care strongly about Varuna, all of whom have expressed excitement and enthusiasm about our new directions.

One of our core values at Varuna is inclusivity, and this has been a particular focus for the Board in 2018. For a long time now, writers with mobility challenges have not been able to stay in residence, and heritage constraints have precluded us from initiating major building modifications. For this reason, the Board has now approved the development of an additional custom-built studio for mobility-impaired writers. We have been successful in securing initial funding for this building and have completed the planning stage. All being well, we plan to commence construction in 2019.

However, inclusivity is not just about physical access. Our wonderful executive team, Veechi Stuart and Amy Sambrooke, has successfully developed several new partnerships and programs to reach a more diverse cohort of writers, and have

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reviewed all assessor panels to better reflect cultural, gender and age diversity. Several new fellowships with literature organisations in Western Sydney and regional Australia have been established, and we are delighted to be offering new mentorship residences with Kill Your Darlings, Scribe Publications and The Wheeler Centre.

2018 also saw a sold-out series of creative writing workshops and author events, the first year of our innovative Young Writers' Program, and an enormously successful writers' festival with 18 events held over three days.



Finally, in order to ensure ongoing best governance practice, the Board commissioned a performance review facilitated by an external consultant. We have identified a number of matters to be addressed over the coming year, which will lead to an improvement in board skills, diversity, and decision-making processes.

Varuna truly is a national treasure. Our Board is proud to be steering it on its journey.

Message from the Executive Team

Every week at Varuna is different. As new writers arrive and others are farewelled, different conversations and connections emerge. Sometimes the house is full of laughter, other times it radiates that quiet intensity so distinctive to Varuna.

Constant however is the commitment from the writers to their writing. Writing that enriches and shapes our culture, and writing we are confident will inspire a new generation of readers and thinkers.

In 2018, we were delighted to welcome several Indigenous writers in residence to Varuna for the first year of our First Nations program. We welcomed Dias Novita Wuri on our first international program with Indonesia, and in exchange, Australian

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writer Annee Lawrence headed off to Ubud and Jakarta. Later in the year, as part of The Wheeler Centre's Next Chapter program, nine emerging writers came together at Varuna, in a week celebrating diversity, artistic excellence and the importance of being given space just to write.

The 2018 Blue Mountains program of the Sydney Writers' Festival was a particularly successful one, engendering lively debate and attracting many people who had never been to our festival before. In exciting news, we will build on this success in 2019, when Varuna will host the first ever independent Blue Mountains Writers' Festival.

We were extremely proud that when surveyed, 96% of writers in residence felt that Varuna helped to improve their artistic skills. Such artistic outcomes are crucial – Varuna is not just a place where writers come to find 'a room of one's own', but rather is a centre for professional development, providing dedicated mentoring, masterclasses and networking opportunities.

We remain grateful to Create NSW and the Australia Council for the Arts for their ongoing core funding, and for contributing to the wonderful richness of Australia's literary landscape.

Goal 1: Artistic practice

To support artistic excellence and the creation of new works through a unique program of fellowships and residencies.

In 2018, Varuna:

- → Provided 190 writers from around Australia over 245 weeks as an artist-in-residence at Varuna.
- Received and professionally assessed over 850 fellowship applications across 13 different programs, an increase of over 100 applications from 2017.
- → Initiated new fellowship partnerships with Bankstown Poetry Slam, Mascara Literary Review, Sweatshop, The Wheeler Centre, Urban Theatre Project and Western Sydney University.
- → Created a new partnership with Kill Your Darlings, funded by the Copyright Agency, to offer a week's mentoring in residence for KYD shortlisted writers.
- → Initiated new publisher relationships with Allen and Unwin, Curtis Brown, HardieGrant and Scribe Publications.
- Directly facilitated the submission of 31 draft works to 8 different reputable publishers, and submitted 9 finalised manuscripts to publishers complete with consultants' reports and recommendations.
- O-ordinated 133 separate manuscript consultations.
- Provided speaking or workshop presenter opportunities for 68 writers.
- → Initiated, and secured private funding for, a new international fellowship with Cove Park in Scotland, one of the most prestigious artist residencies in the United Kingdom.
- Hosted an Indonesian/Australian international exchange in partnership with AsiaLink.
- Set up a new literary fellowship prize with Western Sydney University.

When surveyed, over 97% of our 2018 writers in residence felt that Varuna was one of the best examples of artists' residencies they had seen, 92% reported that Varuna helped build connections with other artists in their field, and 96% reported that Varuna helped to improve their artistic skills.

Goal 2: Diversity

To cultivate, encourage and promote diverse writing and writers.

In 2018, Varuna:

- → Increased the number of applications from writers under 35 for our programs from 14% in 2017 to 18% in 2018.
- → Partnered with the Wheeler Centre to offer residencies to 9 writers from diverse backgrounds as part of The Next Chapter program.



- Created a new 'Rising in the West'
 program, partnering with five Western Sydney literature organisations to offer fellowships and mentoring to Western Sydney writers.
- Provided festival opportunities for diverse writers, with 22% of speakers being from a culturally diverse background.
- Partnered with WestWords to support four young emerging culturally diverse writers from Western Sydney to spend a week at Varuna with a writing mentor.
- → Welcomed a culturally diverse writer from Western Australia, in a flagship fellowship with Katharine Susannah Prichard writing centre.
- Profiled young culturally diverse writers from Western Sydney in a showcase event as part of our festival program.
- Ontinued partnerships with the ASA, Henry Handel Richardson Society and Writing NSW to support residency fellowships for young writers.
- → Provided judging and support for the Blue Fringe literature program, supporting 24 writers with mental health issues.
- → Engaged consultants to develop infrastructure plans that will enable Varuna to be accessible for writers with disabilities.
- Reviewed the diversity composition of staff, volunteers and Board members.

Goal 3: Indigenous writing

To provide enduring and meaningful assistance for the development of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander writers and literature.

In 2018, Varuna:

- Held the first year of our First Nations program, partnering with Magabala Press to welcome six writers on mentoring and residential intensives.
- → Welcomed a total of ten Indigenous writers to Varuna in residence (an increase of eight from 2017).
- Received 29 applications from Indigenous writers.
- Provided individual feedback to 18 submissions from Indigenous writers.
- Developed our Indigenous library, separately cataloguing all Indigenous writing in the Varuna library and identifying the gaps where additional works need to be added.
- → Welcomed Indigenous writer Kim Scott to our Blue Mountains program of the Sydney Writers' Festival.
- → Invited Indigenous writer Lisa Fuller (who won our 2018 Eleanor Dark Flagship Fellowship) to be part of our annual peer-assessed fellowship panel, and to feature in our Young Writers' Program.

→ Facilitated the introduction of a YA manuscript by an emerging Indigenous writer to Magabala Press.

Goal 4: Community engagement

To create a hub for writers and skills development that is well loved by our local community, and which brings economic benefits to our region.

In 2018, Varuna:

- → Launched the first year of its Young Writers' Program, providing 48 high-school students with full-day writing workshops and a monthly writing 'club'.
- → Presented one of our most successful festival programs ever, with 18 events and over 1,500 ticket bookings. 95% of the



- audience reported that they would recommend the Festival to others. We also applied for, and secured funding for, an independent Blue Mountains Writers' Festival to be held in 2019.
- Hosted an Open Day at Varuna with a day-long program of events, attracting 230 visitors. Held the annual Mick Dark Lecture, presented by Charles Massy and attended by over 200 people from all around the region.
- Presented 13 writing workshops, almost all of which were sold out, as well as three week-long masterclasses, focusing on poetry, short stories and memoir. Our writing workshops included a 'regional reach-out' workshop in Lithgow.
- Initiated new community partnerships with the Blue Mountains Cultural Centre, Blue Mountains Food Co-op, Lyttleton Stores, Platform Gallery, Science at the Local and deepened our partnerships with Blue Mountains City Library, Katoomba Neighbourhood Centre and Megalong Books.
- Became a supporter and judge of the What Matters? Writing Competition, run by the Whitlam Institute, which reaches all schools and which attracts over 4,000 entries from young people across NSW, VIC, WA, TAS and the ACT.
- → Donated judging expertise to the Penrith Eisteddfod, and provided both judging and a prize for the Central West Banjo Paterson Poetry Prize.
- Hosted or co-presented six author events in the Blue Mountains, and one at the Northern Territory Writers' Festival.
- Provided opportunities for 36 volunteers to be involved in our programs.

One teacher wrote to us saying that her student, who had just attended our Young Writers' Program, had been so inspired he went home and wrote all night. When he told her this, she was motivated to return to her own creative writing practice, for the first time in many years.

Goal 5: Finance and systems

To establish resilience through diversification of funding sources, manage expenditure prudently, and leverage technology to ensure wise use of limited staff resources.

In 2018, Varuna:

- Increased revenue by over \$34,000 when compared to 2017.
- Increased organisational resilience by diversifying our funding sources, attracting additional project funding from Arts NT, Blue Mountains City Council and Create NSW.
- → Secured additional funding for 2019, including \$27,500 in federal funding for hosting an independent Blue Mountains Writers' Festival in 2019, green energy funding from the Department of Heritage, and three-year funding from the Bridge Awards Foundation for a new international residency program.
- → Secured \$14,900 in corporate sponsorship for our 2018 festival, compared to \$4520 in 2017 and \$2620 in 2016.
- Implemented new software for receiving and reviewing applications, making it easier for writers to apply for our programs, and easier for staff to administrate.
- Participated in a trial of the Culture Counts survey software, digging deeper into the measurement of artistic and cultural outcomes for our programs.
- Implemented new mailing list software, improving the cost-effectiveness, readability and appearance of our email communications.
- Commenced the redesign of our website using the SquareSpace platform.
- Reviewed our backup systems, and increased data security by mirroring data in the cloud.
- Revised and updated our risk matrix, and developed a new risk matrix for events.

I was able to complete a staggering 20,000 words in just five days – Varuna has yet again given me a nurturing and positive environment to feel inspired, to be productive, and to meet incredible new peers and friends; gorgeous dinners for all the residents to share around the table, bringing us together.

Goal 6: Infrastructure and heritage

Our goal is to value and nurture our heritage, while consolidating our future viability through the construction of additional buildings.

In 2018, Varuna:

- Finalised plans for two new buildings, the first being a new community/ meeting building in the Varuna car park, the second being a new residency studio that is accessible for mobility-impaired writers.
- Ommissioned Heritage Reports and Bushfire Reports from expert consultants regarding the new buildings and their recommended location and structure.
- Ommissioned a carbon energy audit and participated in green energy training, resulting in a successful funding application to the Department of Planning for upgrading our heating systems and insulation.
- Worked with historian Margo Beasley to produce a 16-page booklet about the early years of Varuna.
- Ontinued the process of library cataloguing and the organisation of our archives and image library.
- → With the help of volunteers, made significant progress managing weeds on the property, and implemented a weed management plan.
- → Upgraded the furnishings and paintwork in the main living area and studio bedroom.
- → Had the rear façade of the Varuna main building painted.
